National Trust Visit

Moor Pool can still be a surprise, as it was to members of the National Trust when the history society recently conducted them on a walking tour of the Estate. This followed on from a visit to the Back to Backs in the City centre. If you haven't visited yet you should try and make time to do so. The Back to Backs were the starting point for John Sutton Nettlefolds attempts to improve housing conditions in a rapidly expanding Birmingham. As an interim measure the courts between the rows of houses were opened up to allow more air and light, but this only slightly alleviated conditions. A more radical solution was needed and this is what our National Trust visitors saw when they visited Moor Pool. The difference between Moor Pool and the Back to Backs is of course quite extreme with the number of facilities provided here for a healthier lifestyle a surprise to most of those who came. The tour was comprehensive and as part of it we visited and were given a talk on the history of the Harborne Tenants Snooker Club above the Estate Office which was much appreciated. Thanks to MPHT too for providing the lower hall as a refreshment stop. Our Estate tours go back well over 15 years and now as the Moor Pool History & Preservation Society continues to provide talks or guided tours to any interested groups.



The Moor Pool Estate Design Guide

With this issue of The Duck you will have received a copy of the Moor Pool Estate Design Guide. The Association knows that whether you are a new resident of the Estate or have been here for years the Conservation status of the Estate and the planning rules that flow from that designation may not be apparent. The Association regularly receives questions about what is allowed and about when planning consent is required.

Some alterations to houses were done before 2006 when Conservation status was granted and some of those alterations would not now be allowed.

There is in existence a Character Appraisal of the Estate which is a very long document produced by the City Council, a link to which you will find in the Design Guide. However the Association wanted to provide a quick reference Design Guide to explain what is required and why, as well as links to other sites where useful information may be found.

Please keep the Design Guide somewhere safe- perhaps with your property documents and if you are a tenant rather than an owner occupier, please share the Design Guide with your landlord. This is a guide and definitive guidance is available only from the Council Planning Department.

Where planning rules are broken, enforcement by the City Council may follow which would be costly and might affect the future value of your property.

Trees at the Pool

The Moor Pool Heritage Trust have now appointed a tree surgeon to remove four of the big poplar trees by the Pool.

These are in the bank by Park Edge. Phil Simpson, one of the Trustees, presented the detailed proposals at a public meeting on 19th Sept to address the concerns of residents.

Phil outlined the findings of a professional tree survey the Trust commissioned in 2021 which said that poplar trees are prone to dropping branches and even parts of the main trunk. There has already been an incident of this a few years ago in Park Edge. Because of this risk the surveyors recommended that these trees be cut down to ground level within 3 years.

The work will take place later in the year and requires a road closure of Park Edge because it will need a large crane to complete the work. The bat boxes will remain in place as it is possible to leave one tree high enough to keep them without being a future danger. Also it will be possible to carry out the work around the large badger sett without undue disturbance to the badgers.

This is the first part of a more ambitious project to restore the Moor Pool, safeguarding a water supply and making it more accessible to the community. It is hoped, when grants become available, to sink a borehole for the water supply and then replant the area to encourage wildlife and a more vibrant ecology for the Moor Pool.
